

## Working on Our Imperfections as Lent Approaches

As the Word of God shapes us daily, the weekday readings of the past week and the saints we have celebrated offer us a timely invitation to pause and reflect, especially as Lent approaches. They remind us of a consoling and challenging truth: God does not call the perfect, but calls imperfect people and patiently leads them through mercy, repentance, and faith.

This is clearly seen in the life of King David. David was a man of deep faith and courage, yet he also sinned grievously. He committed adultery and arranged the killing of Uriah the Hittite. At another moment, he trusted more in himself and in the number of his armies than in God. These choices brought serious consequences. Yet when David recognised his sin, he did not turn away from God. Instead, he repented and placed himself once again in the Lord's hands. When David was offered three possible punishments, he chose to fall into the hands of God, trusting divine mercy rather than human cruelty. Through this, we learn a vital lesson: God's mercy is greater than our sins, and true strength lies not in power, numbers, or self-reliance, but in humble trust in the Lord.

The Gospel readings echo this same call to faith. When Jesus returns to his hometown, familiarity becomes an obstacle. The people struggle to believe that God is at work among them, and Jesus is amazed at their lack of faith. It is not that Jesus lacks power, but that faith is required of us. Time and again in the Gospels, Jesus says, *"Your faith has saved you."* When our faith meets God's desire to heal and save, remarkable things happen.

This call to faith is closely linked to courage and truth. During the past week, we also remember John the Baptist, who was beheaded by order of Herod because he spoke the truth and was not afraid of the consequences. Like David, John sought only to give glory to God. His witness reminds us that faithfulness is not always easy, but it always leads us closer to God.

The saints of these days reinforce the same message. Saint Agatha, a young woman of the third century, refused a forced marriage and remained faithful to God, even to martyrdom. Saint Paul Miki and his companions suffered public crucifixion for their faith in Christ. Their courage shows us that holiness is not about comfort or perfection, but about fidelity and trust in God.

As David approached the end of his life, he passed on wisdom shaped by experience to his son Solomon: *"Keep the mandate of the Lord."* Having learned through failure and repentance, David knew that trusting God mattered more than armies or power. His life teaches us that while sin has consequences, repentance always opens the way to renewal.

David was far from perfect, yet he loved God with his whole heart. He gave thanks to God in victory, worshipped openly, and even danced before the Ark of the Covenant without fear of what others might think. His heart continually returned to the Lord — and that is what mattered most.

As Lent draws near, we are invited to recognise our own limitations and sins — not with fear, but with hope. Every saint has a past, and every sinner has a future. Holiness is not about never falling, but about trusting God's mercy enough to rise again and give him glory.

We are even more blessed than David. We have something greater than the Ark of the Covenant. In our churches, we have Jesus himself, truly present in the Blessed Sacrament. As we continue to be shaped by the Word of God and spend time before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, may the Lord give us the wisdom to recognise where we are in our lives and the grace to turn back to him with trusting hearts.
