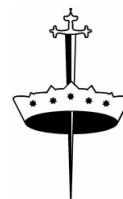

Dust, but Destined for Glory

Last Wednesday, we received ashes and began our Lenten journey. When the ashes were placed on our heads, we heard one of two words: “Repent and believe in the Gospel” or “Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.” Nowadays, we often hear the first formula. It sounds more encouraging. But Lent also asks us not to forget the second: we are dust, and to dust we shall return. Our body is fragile. It is beautiful, but it is corruptible. It ages, it weakens, and one day it will return to the earth.

If we look at Christian tradition, especially in the Middle Ages, we see a strong awareness of human mortality. In the late medieval and early modern periods — particularly from the 14th to the 17th centuries — skulls were commonly used in Christian art, monastic spirituality, and sometimes even in preaching imagery. They were sometimes kept in monastic cells or studies as reminders of mortality. This practice was known as *memento mori* — “remember that you must die.” It was not meant to frighten, but to awaken; not to terrify, but to call people to repentance and wisdom. Over time this imagery declined, not because it was suppressed by Church authority, but simply because pastoral styles and cultural expressions changed.

Yet the message has never disappeared. Ash Wednesday itself is a liturgical *memento mori*. The Church still proclaims: “Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.”

Today we sometimes move to the other extreme. At funerals we focus mainly on celebrating life. We share stories and laugh at happy memories. We avoid saying “died” and prefer “passed away” or even “flown to heaven.” It is good to console families and right to speak with hope. But we cannot run away from the truth: we are dust, and unto dust we shall return. One day we will meet the Lord — who is both just and full of mercy; not a cruel judge, but a merciful one; not someone who wishes to condemn, but one who desires to save.

In the First Reading of this First Sunday of Lent, Adam and Eve feel naked after their sin — a sign of lost trust. They forgot that God had breathed His life into them and that they were created in His image and likeness.

We too are dust — but dust filled with the breath of God.

Through baptism, we are reborn. Our bodies are mortal, yet we are born from an incorruptible seed. As Jesus says, a grain of wheat must fall into the earth and die in order to bear fruit.

We will return to dust, but we are called to rise with the Risen Lord. Nothing can separate us from the love of Christ.

In today’s Gospel, just after His baptism — when His identity as the beloved Son was revealed — Jesus was led by the Holy Spirit into the desert. Immediately after grace came testing; immediately after affirmation came fasting and prayer. Even for Jesus, the desert was part of the journey.

We too are baptised. We, too are children of God. But baptism is not a magic guarantee that life will be easy. It is the beginning of a path — and that path includes desert seasons.

That is why Lent is our desert time: a time of prayer, fasting, and quiet sacrifice; a time to fast not only from food, but from worry instead of trust, from complaint instead of gratitude, from noise instead of silence; a time to return to the Lord. Jesus entered the desert trusting the Father. We enter Lent trusting the same Father.

We are dust — yes — but we are dust destined for glory. And if we walk faithfully with Christ through the desert, we will share in His resurrection.

May we trust in the Lord, who is both just and full of mercy.
